The Shrivenham Village Fete Committee organises several events throughout the year, the largest being the August Bank Holiday Summer Fete (Saturday 24th August).

We kick off our year on 5th May with a free "Party on the Rec", with live music, food and drink, and fun events for the children like pony rides and inflatables so that they can let off steam safely. This is just our way of saying thank-you to the village for supporting all of our events (as well as having an excuse for a party!)

Each year we purchase and put up the village Christmas Tree; and organise the Village Christmas Carol service, accompanied by a Silver Band, where villagers can congregate for some festive fun and a visit from Santa! Each Boxing Day we hold Shrivenham's unique "Woozel Hunt" where we get together to walk off any Christmas Day excesses, and finishing with more mulled wine and mince pies!

Any monies collected through public donations during the year are topped up from the Fete profits; and distributed at the February AGM to local good causes in the Shrivenham area. To-date we have supported many deserving causes: the local school, church, guides and scouts wanting to travel to international events, our junior football team, a local charity providing woodworking lessons for people with learning difficulties, people in the village who want to set up their own events, our village choir and multiple nursery/pre-school activity groups just to mention a few.

Generations of Sound is a village choir open to everyone.

The aims of the choir are threefold: To promote community activity through singing, to provide educational, recreational and social opportunities for members and to promote friendship through music. We meet at 7pm each Wednesday evening in the Methodist church and adjourn to the Prince of Wales for a drink at 9.00. New members are always very welcome.

2018 saw the choir giving a Summer and a Christmas concert at the Memorial Hall where we are accompanied by a band. A very wide range of music was presented from pop songs and songs from musicals to choral works as well as the much loved 'singalong' and 'dance along' songs and both evenings were very successful.

In addition to our concerts the choir opened the village fete and contributed to the 'carols round the tree'. We also performed a range of singalong songs in two different care homes and sang in two WW1 Centenary Commemorations as well as singing Christmas Carols at Nationwide for charity and joining in two musical evenings held at the Barrington Arms.

2019 has seen a change of committee and an increase in our social activities. This year's Christmas concert will take place as in previous years but the summer concert will take the form of a soiree on a Sunday evening in the summer. The emphasis will be on voices accompanied by a pianist and we will run a bar.

There are plans for more social events including a quiz night to raise funds and the possibility of an exchange with a choir from the Somme in France. We are also developing a website to promote our activities.

The second half was a poignant one act play "After the flags and banners" directed by David Pratt. This years Pantomime was Robin Hood and the Babes in the Wood written by Michael Garland. It was directed by Michael Garland and Sharon Rose and choreographed by Kym Rose. It was a great success and it was wonderful to see so many young people on stage.

SHRIVENHAM CRICKET CLUB.

ANNUAL REPORT 2018.

Following its promotion to Division 4 of the Oxfordshire Cricket Association (OCA) league, the 2018 season proved to be a challenging one for Shrivenham Cricket Club. As expected the Club faced stiffer opposition, but with some determined performances the team managed to finish in a creditable mid-table position, thereby retaining its division 4 status. The team battled well in the OCA's Telegraph Cup competition, losing to Hook Norton, one of the league's strongest teams, in a close fought semi-final. The match was lost in a tense final over, and could have gone either way.

Disappointingly two of the Division 4 Clubs withdrew from the league during the season, which reduced the number of fixtures to be played, but the OCA has re-configured the league structure so that 2019 will provide a full fixture list, with some tough games ahead.

The long dry summer presented significant challenges for the Club's grounds team. The outfield took on the appearance of something out of a spaghetti western, with much of the grass being burnt to a crisp. However skilled management and a careful programme of selective watering, overseen by Dick Burrough, the Club's long serving and experienced groundsman, saved the cricket square itself and ensured that the Club could fulfil all its home fixtures.

At junior level the Club continued to participate in the ECB's "All Stars Cricket" programme, with some 27 juniors signing up to take part. Our coaches also provided coaching sessions for older juniors during the early season. Both the "All Stars Cricket" and older juniors' programmes are set to continue this season beginning in May. Details will be available on the Club's website.

Off the field the Club is continuing to work with the Barrington Trust on the project to construct a new sports pavilion on the Memorial Field. Planning permission has now been granted by the Vale of White Horse District Council and it is hoped that construction can begin in the autumn. With a fair wind, 2020 could see the Club using a brand new purpose built building, which should do much to enhance its image and allow it to provide facilities to match any in the league. The Club is confident that the major expansion the village is experiencing will result in more players wishing to play local cricket. Players of all abilities will be welcome and the new pavilion should ensure its off the field facilities can match their expectations and encourage them to join the Club.

VISCOUNTESS BARRINGTON'S HOMES FOR DISABLED EX- SERVICE
MEN AND WOMEN (Charity 205219)

This Charitable Trust, administered under the auspices of the Charity Commission and managed under Almshouse Association guidelines, currently owns 13 homes (7 houses and 6 apartments, housing 17 adult residents).

The Trust was established in the early 1920's to promote well-being in the village and to provide homes for veterans returning from the 1st World War. Most of the homes were built in the 1920's and included workrooms to encourage occupants to provide for a living for themselves. The newest block of 4 apartments, closest to the Fairthorne Rd. roundabout on the High Street, was completed in 2005.

The criteria to be a resident of one of the homes include a strong Military Service link, a local connection, a physical disability, and the financial need for charitable housing. There is no waiting list per se for residency, rather a list of interested persons. When a vacancy arises it is advertised in various local and Service publications and the most deserving case within the criteria is selected.

The properties are all self-contained homes and are easily visible from the Recreation Ground which is managed by our 'sister' Trust - The Viscountess Barrington Memorial Hall and Recreation Ground Trust.

Residents are charged a 'below market rate' weekly maintenance contribution in line with Almshouse Association guidelines, which the Charitable Trust relies on to fund ongoing cyclical and emergency maintenance. Major refurbishment is usually undertaken when a property becomes vacant, within financial limitations.

Demand for existing properties upon vacancies occurring encouraged the Trustees to explore the possibility of enlarging the property portfolio. Planning permission was been obtained to build additional properties on Trust owned land adjacent to the Football Club, but unfortunately this lapsed in 2018. Funding this development is proving an ongoing challenge.

Although the Trust is not responsible for the welfare of the residents, occasional help is provided in dealing with agencies such as the local council and care centers as and when appropriate.
